Environmental Policy Summit

We embraced the chance to co-sponsor the 6th Annual Arkansas Environmental Policy Summit on Nov. 5, along with our friends at Arkansas Interfaith Power and Light, Sierra Club - Arkansas Chapter, Audubon Delta, and the Arkansas Public Policy Panel. League Administrator Robert McAfee organized and facilitated a Climate Justice Panel featuring League friend Benetick Maddison, a project specialist with the Marshallese Educational Initiative, and League Board member Dr. Paulette Meikle, Associate Dean at UAFS. League Program Director Jan Schaper moderated the clean energy panel.

Our passion is encouraging, engaging, and providing educational opportunities for individuals concerned about climate justice. From the beginning RELATIONSHIPS have been the HEART of our work. OUTREACH, EDUCATION & COLLABORATION

The League continued to hold gatherings online rather than in person. These included:

- **"Environmental Justice Primer"** led by Reverend Soniyyah "Sonna" B. Key
- "Let's Talk About A Just Energy Transition": a panel discussion inspired by Shalanda Baker's book **Revolutionary Power**. Our three panelists Dr. Joanna Person-Michener, Shelley Buonaiuto, and Dr. Paulette Meikle walked through the Why, What, and How of securing a clean energy shift that doesn't rewrite the old script of environmental injustice, but rather benefits, empowers, and includes low income communities. The conversation included a roadmap for local application.

Citizens First Congress

The League is a proud member of Citizens' First Congress, a coalition of organizations working to improve Arkansas state policies. In concert with the CFC's Environmental Caucus, the League educated Arkansans about two clean energy bills the Caucus wrote and worked to have introduced into the 2021 Arkansas legislative session. Despite the best efforts of the Environmental Caucus, neither of the bills advanced out of committee. Much experience was gained, and Caucus members are already having informal discussions about next steps.




